## Stripping Away the "Prison Look"

Over decades of maintenance, security bars are often painted repeatedly by homeowners using thick brushes and cheap paint. This results in globs of paint that drip, obscure the metalwork, and create a lumpy, uneven texture. It looks messy and cheap, detracting from the home's facade. Sandblasting strips these twenty layers of latex and oil paint down to the raw steel. It reveals the clean lines of the bars and re-exposes any decorative scrolls or castings that were hidden. By removing the bulk of the old paint, the bars physically look lighter, crisper, and more elegant, while retaining their full structural strength. It changes the visual language from "fortress barricade" to "decorative ironwork."

## Identifying Weak Points

Security bars are only as good as their welds and mounting points. Rust often attacks the joints where the bars meet the frame, or the tabs where the screws go into the masonry. These rusted joints become weak points that can be snapped easily with a pry bar by an intruder. Blasting the metal clean exposes these structural vulnerabilities that paint might be hiding. It allows a welder to repair the joints or reinforce the mounting tabs before the new finish is applied. This restoration process actually improves the security function of the installation, ensuring the bars can withstand a physical attack and do their job effectively.

## Modern Finishes for Historic Buildings

Many brownstones and historic row houses feature ornate ironwork that doubles as security. Painting these gloss black is the default choice, but it can look severe and heavy. Powder coating offers softer, more sophisticated options. A matte graphite, a dark architectural bronze, or a textured "wrought iron" finish can soften the appearance of the bars. These finishes blend better with brick, stone, and stucco, making the security measures feel integrated into the architecture rather than bolted on top. It respects the historic character of the neighborhood while providing modern protection standards.

### **Rust Prevention in Tight Spaces**

The biggest failure point for security doors and window guards is the mesh or the tight scrollwork. A paintbrush simply cannot reach into the tight corners and overlaps to seal the metal effectively. Moisture gets in, and rust bleeds out, staining the surrounding masonry. Powder coating uses an electrostatic charge to attract the powder particles to every surface, even in the tightest crevices. When cured in the oven, the powder flows into a seamless, watertight shell. This complete encapsulation prevents the "rust bleed" that ruins the look of white window sills and brickwork underneath the bars, reducing maintenance for years.
