

The Beauty of the Shadow: Designing for Dark Spaces



Imagine a corner of your garden where the summer heat cannot reach. It is cool, green, and serene. The light filters through the canopy of a maple tree, dappling the ground in soft patterns. Ferns unfurl their delicate fronds, and the broad, blue-green leaves of hostas catch the stray beams of sun. This is the beauty of a shade garden. A small water feature creates sound that seems louder and clearer in the quiet of the trees.
